


POST WAR CANADA

- After the Russian Revolution
- Factories were shutting down
- Cost of living rose 64% since 1913
- Wages have not kept pace
- High Rates of unemployment
- Little Employment Standards
- People resented huge profits made during the war at the expense of workers and soldiers



STRIKE!

- Winnipeg Building and Metal Workers went on Strike May 1st and 2 weeks later called for a general strike. (after months of trying to be recognized)
- First to walk were the "hello girls", Winnipeg's telephone operators
- By 11 am, 30,000-50,000 union and non-union workers had walked off the job
- As word of the General Strike Spread, Sympathy strikes were called in Brandon, Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatoon, Prince Albert, Regina, Vancouver, New West Minister, Victoria and in as Many as 20 other towns.
- Was of National and International importance
- (Unions were formed by voluntary recognition or strike action, no labour board votes or signing cards then)







SPECIALS

- The Police has voted to strike but were asked to stay on by the strike committee
- The Federal Government got involved and deployed the North West Mounted Police.
- Ottawa ordered federal employees to return to work or face dismissal
- The Canadian Government amended the immigration act so British born immigrants could be deported
- The criminal codes definition of sedition was broadened
- All these actions to intimidate eh workers back to work.
- The mayor of Winnipeg, Charles Gray, fired most of the police as officers were sympathetic to the strikers
- 1,800 special constables were recruited and paid for by the business community receiving an armband and bats or wagon spokes, to keep order

JUNE

- 10th a riot broke out after the "specials" tried to disperse a crowd listening to a speech
- A few days later 10 union leaders were arrested
- Speeches by strike leaders and gatherings were banned
- On Saturday June 21st war vets organized a parade to protest restrictions





Bloody Saturday

A streetcar driven by scab labour came around the corner and was rocked or tipped over (reports differ)

Shots rang out

- Killing 2
- Wounding 34
- And arresting 96

The Strike came to an end shortly after



GAINS

POLITICAL

- Empowered and engaged the public
- Every Level of Government changed
- Civic election labour seats from 5 to 7
- 1920 provincial election 11 labour representatives elected (3 strike leaders elected while still in jail)
- 1921 J.S. Woodsworth elected to parliament
- 1935 John Gordon elected Mayor
- Set the stage for formation of CCF 1932

LEGISLATIVE

- Premier Norris called a Royal Commission into living and working conditions
- 1921 first ever min. wage established at \$0.25/hour
- Over subsequent years we establish legislation to protect union rights, organize, H & S legislation, healthcare, home care, MPI, CPP
- Set the framework for the employment standards and labour legislation we enjoy today

COMMUNITY

- 1919 establishment of Community Welfare Council (later to be called Social Planning Council)
- 1921 \$100,000 start to the Winnipeg Foundation
- Welfare Council and Winnipeg Foundation form the community chest in 1921 (today known as United Way)






